A Message from Our Rector, Fr. Kevin M. Cross

We started out 2020 like every other year. We planned new programs and events, sought to build new ties among us, and endeavored to expand our community beyond our boundaries. Worship and a strong collective identity as a people of God, was celebrated and were the glues that bound us together as a community.

But then we all were challenged in ways unimaginable. Covid 19 came on the scene quickly and for most of us unexpectedly. And, since then, no one of us has been left unaffected. We all have faced a challenge something no one among us had ever experienced before. There were no guidelines. No safety nets. All of us, in some fashion, has had to cope with isolation and being beset by fear.

A smooth sea never made a skilled sailor. This has been a year of year of rough seas, contrary winds, unknown waters

I recently finished reading a book about another time when fear and uncertainty gripped the land. **The Splendid and the Vile** tells the story of Britain, focusing on Churchill and his family during the first year of the conflict that devolved into WWII. While it is primarily a study of leadership it is also a story of a people and how they coped during such a terrible time. I was struck by the brave, common resolve of the people that brought that nation through a fearful and uncertain time. Now this book only tells the beginning of the story, obviously it went on much longer than the focus on this book and precedents were set in motion long before the beginning of 1940. However, the people found strength in their identity as a nation and their common life together in community. And, they were able to do so by overcoming numerous major disagreements and divisions that were present in their society at that time. Their resolve and actions reminded me of a quote by Martin Luther King Jr., who during the troubles of his time, said that there was always a choice to be made and that choice was between “chaos or community.” They chose community.



There are lessons from these times for us. One of the greatest of them is that we only get through tough times when we identify and act as community – as a family. Let’s face it, God created us relational beings. God’s presence is only fully manifested amongst us when we live as a community – as a family. These understandings of God and the nature of creation provides us with some signposts and a framework for dealing with our great challenges.

Certainly, Covid makes our living as a community a very difficult task. But the really good news is about the choice you have made. You have chosen community over chaos. Chaos could easily have reigned over this community. However, you chose another way. Whilst we were being challenged anew each day, you dug deeply to call up the resources God has endowed upon this community and you have employed these resources to stay connected with and support each other. You have called into use our collective resiliency, creativity, and compassion to find ways to stay connected and help each other. All of which, you have to admit, is quite an achievement during a time when the greater society is so divided and fractured. I am very proud and happy to part of your community. You are a blessing.

Our annual report is filled with stories of resilience. It is also filled with good news about the health of this community. I hope you take time to read it and find stories of hope and good news in our collective stories. We have a good future ahead of us. My desire is that the stories of this community will sustain you in the days ahead. And in the words of James Taylor, know in your heart that in this community “You’ve Got A Friend.” You have a friend in Jesus, and you have many friends in this community of the followers of Jesus.

God is with us in our daily struggle and we can take comfort “for the Lord will not forsake his people, for his great name’s sake, because it has pleased the Lord to make you a people for himself.” **1 Samuel 12:22**

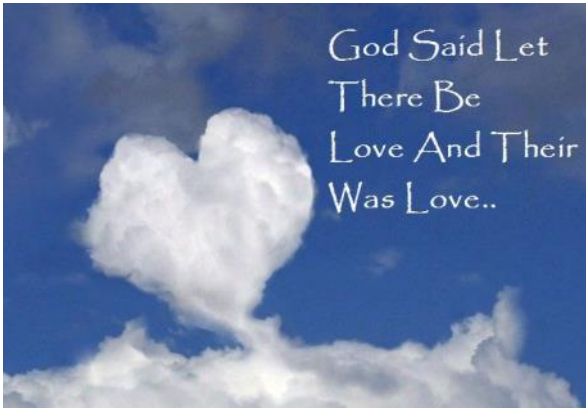

- Lastly but not least, great appreciation and thanks to all of you for your flexibility, understanding and good community spirit. You all have been a blessing in my life.

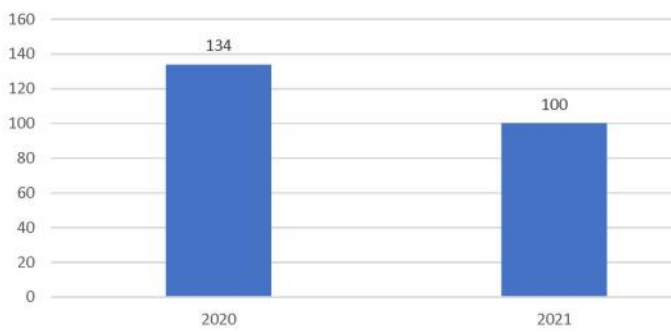

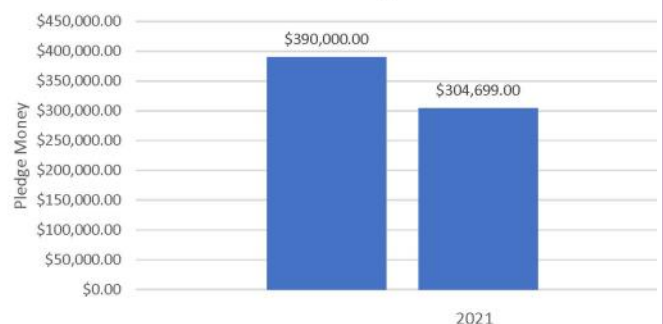

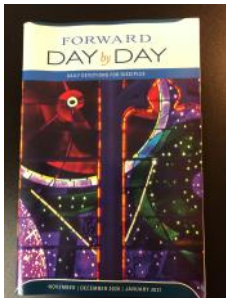

Sunday School

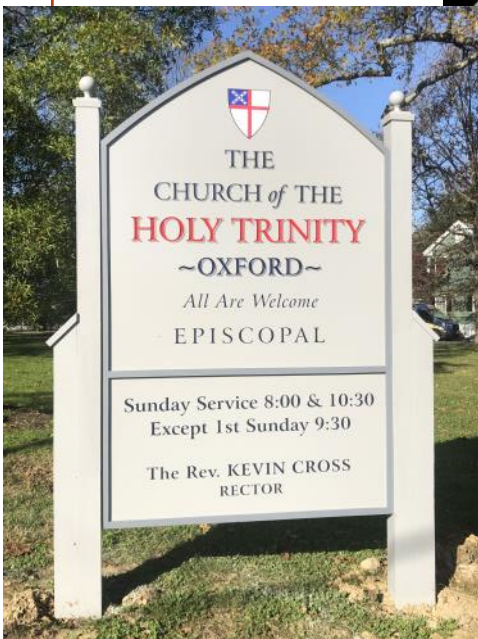

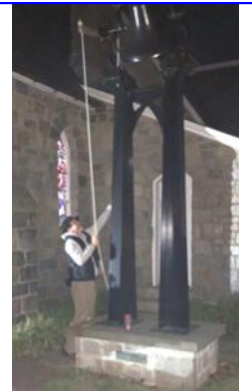

ANNUAL MEETING OF CHURCH OF THE HOLY TRINITY-OXFORD DECEMBER 6, 2020

The Annual Meeting was called to order by Fr. Kevin at 10:45 A.M. on Sunday, November 6, 2020. Fr. Kevin opened with prayer, then welcomed everyone and explained that all who are attending virtually, *via* Zoom, have been given the opportunity to submit and will be invited to vote on approval of the budget and election of nominees to the Vestry and delegates to the Diocesan Convention by email until 1:00 P.M., Sunday afternoon.

Fr. Kevin offered words of assurance that, despite the limitations created by the pandemic, our parishioners have remained faithful in their regular attendance at our Sunday services, in person or virtually. Additionally, many have participated in regular prayer service and committee meetings. He commented that, having given more than \$50,000 to local, national, and international mission, we have remained consistent in our outreach to others less fortunate than we. Fr. Kevin thanked Cora, Connie, Lisa, Barbara, and all the “roadies,” who had assisted in broadcasting our regular services throughout the year.

Sr. Warden Gordon Fronk informed the parishioners of the procedure for selecting Vestry nominees, whereby the Senior Warden and three retiring Vestry members constitute the Nominations Committee. This year, Meg van den Berg, Bill Ritchie, and Ed Delaney (who stood in after the passing of our beloved Otts Schnellenberger) considered over 40 well qualified parishioners, from whom they selected the three persons to be nominated to serve for the three-year term commencing January 1, 2021.

Gordon moved the nominations of Loretta Blume, Susan Segal, and Michelle Mactavish. The motion was seconded and approved unanimously by all attending in person.

Next, Gordon reported that newly-elected Vestry members are asked to serve as delegates to the Annual Convention of the Diocese, which will be held, using Zoom, in March 2021. Loretta and Michelle are willing and able to attend; however, Susan’s internet reception is very unstable, so she requested that another person be chosen. Ray Munsch agreed to serve as the third delegate. David Wangsness and Gordon agreed to serve as alternates. Gordon moved the approval of the delegates and alternates. The motion was seconded and approved unanimously by all attending in person.

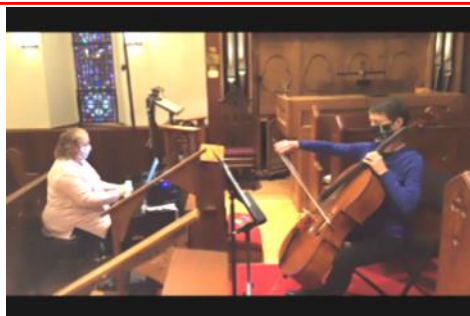
Gordon thanked the retiring Vestry members, Meg, Bill, and Otts, for their devoted service to our parish over the past three years. He expressed his hope that Meg would assist in the transition of the scheduling of lectors, acolytes and ushers and remain involved in the life of our parish. He thanked Bill for his detailed attention to our buildings and grounds and noted that Bill had agreed to continue to serve in the role as Junior Warden. And he expressed optimism that someone would assume the active role with Habitat for Humanity, which Otts had faithfully served over the past several years.

Dave Wangsness provided an overview of the 2020 financial status of the parish and presented a proposed budget for 2021.

2020 Financial Update: Although it has been an extremely challenging year, pledges through September have been on budget. The congregation was thanked for maintaining its pledges during a very difficult year. Also, during April, we applied for and received \$33.5K from the federal Paycheck Protection Program (PPP). Finally, not knowing what the impact of the pandemic might be, the Vestry made an effort to reduce the church’s daily operating expenses. Primary reductions were in the area of facilities (utilities and custodial services), which were not being utilized at the budgeted level, and expenses for worship and music. In summary, with the addition of higher revenue from the PPP and lower operating expenses, the church is expected to generate an operating surplus in 2020. This healthy surplus has allowed us to pay for the additional mission needs, due to the pandemic, and absorb some of the capital requirements incurred to meet the challenge of virtual services.

2021 Preliminary Budget : A Preliminary Budget for 2021 was then presented. The challenges from the pandemic are expected to continue for some time during 2021. As a result, the budget for 2021 continues to be conservative and reflects no increase from the budgeted 2020 pledge level. In addition, because no new federal program, similar to PPP, can be assumed, total revenues for 2021 will likely be lower than 2020 by the amount received for the PPP. Finally, as we begin to recover from the pandemic, operating expenses will exceed those of 2020, as we increase the utilization of our buildings. In summary, with pledges remaining at the same level budgeted in 2020
