Addiction Recovery Month

I invite you to recognize the role of the church in ministering to those who have been affected by the disease of addiction. September is designated as National Recovery Month. It is an observance held every September to educate Americans that substance use treatment and mental health services can enable those with a mental and/or substance use disorder to live a healthy and rewarding life.

The church can play a critical healing role in reaching out to those whose lives have been afflicted by the disease of addiction by offering understanding, compassion, and healing. Now more than ever witnesses of healing and mercy are needed to make known the Good News of Jesus Christ to those who are suffering. As you may be aware, the opioid crisis is impacting every demographic of our population. Overdoses are now the leading cause of death amongst the young and middle aged.

Holy Trinity has set aside Sunday September 28th to focus on addiction and the merciful recovery to be found in the Christian faith. It may interest you to know that the 12-step programs have their foundation in the Episcopal Church. The Rev. Sam Shoemaker of Calvary Episcopal Church in NYC, was a spiritual adviser to Bill Wilson. He worked with Bill W. on developing A.A.'s 12-Step Program. The theology of the 12-Step program is grounded in our faith tradition. While the 12-Step program is often thought of as only applicable for those who suffer from one of the many forms of addiction, it offers a profoundly spiritual program for all. We will celebrate a 12 Step Eucharist on Sunday, September 28th at our 8 & 10 services.

bagpiper music. and the wearing of kilts. We will sing hymns, pray prayers from our Celtic roots, give thanks for our heritage, and bless the Tartans.



Property and Grounds Report.

Bill Ritchie - Property. Michelle MacTavish - Grounds

We have had a busy spring and summer:

Property.

A scheduled replacement of the failed HVAC system in the kitchen was approved this year by the Vestry. State and local regulations required that the HVAC system in the kitchen fulfilled full commercial kitchen requirements in spite of the Church's limited usage. After much discussion with our HVAC Contractor it was decided that two low profile ceiling units would be functionally optimal, minimally intrusive and relatively easy to install. At the same time, we took the opportunity to add heating elements to the AC units in the River Room and the upstairs Offices which were previously heated by baseboard, hot water from the old oil burning furnace. With these improvements we will be able to retire and remove the Parish Hall oil burning furnace and oil storage tank.

During this time it became apparent that the air conditioning unit above the Rector's and the secretary's office, although correctly sized was not able to cool the space, and it was discovered that there was no insulation in the roof ceiling and knee walls and this accounted for large heat gains and losses in the offices during the summer and winter making working there somewhat intolerable especially in the Summer. Estimates were obtained and the appropriate insulation is scheduled to be installed.

Although this was considerably more work than we had intended to do this year, updating the HVAC systems, discontinuing the use of the old oil burner in the parish hall and improving the office insulation should have immediate economic and environmental benefits.

Then in August an emergency situation developed in the Rectory when the ground floor HVAC system failed. Initial replacement of an electronic control board did not completely correct the situation and a new compressor unit has been ordered and will be installed in the current unit. There is a high probability that this will return the unit to full capacity and hopefully several more years of useful service. P.S. I am keeping my fingers crossed for the rest of the financial year and beyond.

Grounds.

When you drive onto the church property from Morris Street, you may notice that something is amiss. In August, one of our monumental Cedrus deodara cedar trees, (one of three), was taking down after a year of decline. As stewards of the stunningly beautiful church grounds, it is sad to see it go and is a reminder that maintaining the health of the 50+ trees on the property should always be a priority.

The cedar served as a part of the buffer area between the Oxford Inn and the Holy Trinity driveway. Now we can focus on that area, clearing brush and considering new plantings to create a more organized and easily maintained natural border between the properties.
